What is Rotary?

For the benefit of all, especially our guests, Mary Ann Kelly outlined a concise history of the Rotary organisation: how it has grown from the four business acquaintances who met in Chicago USA in 1905 to the 1.2 million members that we have today throughout the world – in 34,000 clubs.

She defined Rotary's Areas of Focus and the Four-Way Test – which govern our day-to-day lives.

She then proceeded to outline the history of our Club since its inauguration in 1929 to

the present day. She touched on the major achievements such as the Borambola Fitness Camp, Camp Quality, the Read-To-Me program, RYDA, the SHINE Awards, the Tutuala projects and Darkness-to-Light (to mention just a few).

The Book Fair, which occurs each year in May, is now our major source of income; our BBQ Team is perpetually active assisting the community and in addition to all this activity we enjoy an active social life.

She concluded with the story of Rex, a sponsored worker from the Philippines, employed at a local industrial plant. Rex required a kidney transplant but as he wasn't an Australian citizen, there were major complications. Effectively, the actions and representations of some of our Club members gained him permanent residency and saved his life.
