Bit's n Pieces from/about members

Song Writer Jack O'Hagan. 1898-1987. (contributed by *Peter Murray*)

- He wrote over 600 Songs including "Along the road to Gundagai". (1921)
 - Peter Dawson's recording of this song in 1931 sold 50,000 copies in six months.
 - When he wrote the Gundagai song he was contemplating between Gundagai or Bundaberg. Thankfully for Gundagai it won out and was a winner.
 - Once when he was dining with Irving Berlin he commented that he had never been to Gundagai. (He did visit Gundagai in 1956 when the town celebrated its centenary.)
 - Irving Berlin replied that he had never seen the Mississippi when he wrote "Old man River".
- Other songs were "Where the dog sits on the Tuckerbox".(1938),
 - " When a boy from Alabama meets a girl from Gundagai". He
 - "Our Don Bradman" (1930)
 - "A lone girl flier" (Honouring Amy Johnson)
 - "Kingsford-Smith, Aussie is proud of you", and
 - "Wrap Me Up In My Stock Whip and Blanket".(1936).
- When Jack O'Hagan passed away on 15 July 1987, I was approached by Gundagai's Anglican Minister the Rev. Bill Wright saying "It would be only fitting if someone from Gundagai attended his Funeral Service at St. Finbars Church at Brighton" as he stated "his song had put Gundagai on the map. At that time I was President of the Gundagai Chamber of Commerce. Bill, and another Gundagai citizen Joe Reardon and I attended the Church Service and his Burial in the Brighton Cemetery.

A House I once Lived In. (contributed via ZOOM by Peter Smart).

Peter showed the meeting a 1990 watercolour depicting the house in Tottington where he lived. it dates back to the mid 18t century. Peter and Vida lived there in the early years of their marriage. It also shows their two dogs, *Sam* and *Ella*, who eventually accompanied the Smarts on their journey to Australia. Peter told us that Ella produced a puppy which they called *Typhi*. In 1930, Rotary came to Wagga Wagga - 25 years after its founding in Chicago. Seventy years on, it's hard to conjure up an image of the days in which the club was launched, so we've researched it a bit in the Advertiser of the day to help set the mood for you.

DEPRESSION DAYS.



The world economy was depression, and, believe it or not, the 44 hour week was repealed in favour of a 48 hour week. (Do those groans come from the workers of today or bosses?).Another Bill Parliament reduced Public Service Salaries by 25% (More groans).

Jobs were scarce in those early depression



years. Wirths Circus sought 12 handymen, and 800 applied - so 30 men were hired. (There were some good news stories about)

A popular way of making a few bob, was by rabbit trapping. On one day, forty four tons of rabbit skins were sold at the Sydney market prices up 1d. to 2d a pound.

SOCIAL ISSUES



The 'demon drink' was the focus rather than drugs. Prohibition was in vogue in the U.S. It was reported that

three people died and 59 were taken to hospital through poisoned bootleg liquor.


Day of the Cigarette

Talkies


A few years earlier, Harry M. Warner, of Warner Bros. fame, had asked "Who the hell wants to hear actors talk?" By 1930, however,

had won the Riverina Handicap over 1 mile in 1m.36 2/5s on a Delocette motorcycle.


ROTARY

The DA of Monday 19th May 1930, recorded that arrival, noting a bit of Rotary trivia: that the first fine levied in the Club, 2shillings, was made by Sgt. at Arms Alfred Nathan President Harry on Michelmore, for" performing the first act in Rotary Wagga". More significant Rotary news was to follow in ensuing years.

So there you are. Someone said that " the only good thing about the good old days is, they're never coming back." Cynic.


