Lyndal Seymour was the lucky winner of the wine this week. After the conclusion of the meeting, an eagle-eyed Graham Russell noticed that Lyndal had forgotten to take her prize home. He very quickly volunteered to 'mind' it for her, adding that it would be perfectly safe with him because she had chosen the 'white'!

<u>Key-Note Speaker.</u>

Our Guest Speaker, Jim Gibson was introduced by Barry Francis who told of the many "hats" that Jim has worn— the latest being Legacy.



Jim commenced his address by stating that he was proud to be a member of Legacy and very much humbled by the work Legacy does for War Widows and Children.

In World War I, from a population of 4.9 million, Australia provided 400,000 volunteers and 2000 nurses, and suffered 60,000 war deaths and 150,000 wounded. 64 Victoria Crosses (including 7 from Anzac Cove) were awarded. Legacy was founded in 1923 in Melbourne by young business men all of whom were returned soldiers. It was modelled on the Remembrance Club in Hobart founded by a young man whose mate asked him to look after his wife and kids if he didn't make it back from the war. This is basically the ethos of Legacy today.



What does Legacy do?

Legacy is unique in the world in that it helps war widows and dependants of veterans, basically in any way that is necessary. It receives no government assistance for its work.

Wagga Legacy commenced in 1932, and it was the 16th club in Australia. Today there are 48 clubs in total. All Legacy Workers are Volunteers and Legacy receives no Government Funding.

In years past, each small town had a Legacy Club. Today, Wagga Legacy looks after 17 surrounding towns.

The number of widows and dependants of war veterans is declining Australia wide. In the past 10 years, the number of widows cared for by Legacy Australia has declined from 1290 to 561. Currently approximately 60% are over 90 years of age, so the decline will continue. Legacy has adjusted the support it provides in order to cater for this aging demographic. There are currently seven families and 11 children who are receiving assistance in Wagga along with the more elderly War Widows.

Today there are 25 to 40 widows aged roughly from 85 to 100 years who meet regularly at Legacy House in Wagga for a "Cuppa" and a chat along with some form of entertainment as part of the 'Laurel Club'. Jim gave us some examples of the work that Legacy does. He also cited some of the work done in 1946-47.

Philip Cross thanked Jim for his very informative talk and presented him with a certificate to immunise 10 children somewhere in the world against polio.

The last few minutes.....

As there was a little time left President David asked that we discuss at our tables some ideas regarding local causes who would benefit from our major donations during the year. These ideas will be collated at the next Board Meeting so that a decision can be made.
