#### Fines-Master Session.

David Kennedy commenced by testing those members who are aged 70+ years with some tricky questions, allowing those younger to breathe easy. Then he pounced on those younger members who fared equally poorly.

He made the job of the fine collectors easier by announcing an "all in" \$5 fine that stopped members from displaying their inadequacies.

He finished with a humorous Irish tale involving alcohol, broken glass, band aids and a hall mirror.

#### Key-Note Speaker.

Don Pembleton introduced Barry Griffith, a Deputy Zone Commander for the SES. He had served some twenty years with the Australian Army prior to joining SES, and during his military service served in Afghanistan with Kieran Jackel, a former member of our club.



Barry commenced his presentation with a slide show and proceeded to detail the SES's role in our community. The SES is actual the legislated Combat Agency for Flood, Storm and Tsunami Disasters – although Barry did point out that in our particular area the latter is extremely unlikely in this region. The SES provides general land rescue, vertical rescue, bush

and alpine search and rescue and incident management as some of their services. In this zone alone he has 40 units, and approximately 700 volunteers.

The Volunteers can differ from working within a unit, a community action team, a corporate unit or as a spontaneous volunteer in reaction to a specific event. For example the floods we had here in Wagga in the CBD in 2012, Spontaneous Volunteers filled Sandbags.


Barry stated that current SES volunteers were aged from 16yrs to 92yrs and whatever their skill set, they are put to work according to their capability and skill. Therefore if management and communication is a volunteers forte, then that would be the area they would try to be placed.



At the end of his presentation, the members had a lot of questions, which Barry was able to answer, a lot to do with the kinds of jobs that the SES do. Most volunteers would work approximately 4-6 hours a week, but it would depend on the area they were in, and the time of year.

At the conclusion of the presentation, Alan Lean gave the Vote of Thanks, remarking on the role of the SES in the Flood event in Wagga CBD in 2011 and as is customary, Barry was presented with a Certificate of Undertaking to Immunise 10 children against Polio somewhere in the world.
