Since the first season of the NSWRFL (1908), the trophy awarded to the premiership-winning team has had several names and shapes......The Labor Daily Cup, JJ Giltinan Shield, WD&HO Wills Cup, Winfield Cup and The Optus Cup.

The Provan-Summons Trophy depicts the two drenched and mud-coated 'gladiators' from the 1963 Grand Final between St George and Western Suburbs.

Key-Note Speaker.

Ably introduced by President David, our guest speaker for the evening was Brett Sommerville, who is the Club Manager of PCYC Wagga Wagga. In a very informative presentation, Brett outlined the many facets of PCYC and the value of this organisation to the community of Wagga Wagga.



With 64 clubs involving 800 civilian and police staff servicing 125,000 members, PCYC aims to provide a safe environment for youth where they can participate in programs and activities which engage them in the community on their terms. PCYC endeavours to deliver their programs in an ethical, environmental and community sustainable way. The core values of 'Respect, Commitment, Resilience, Integrity, Citizenship' underpin PCYC activities and programs.

The range of activities and programs offered by PCYC statewide is vast. 1500 young people under direct police case management participate in Police Programs, the Safer Drivers Course (25,000) and Traffic Offenders Intervention Program (55,000) focus on keeping our young people safe on the road, Origins of Nations Indigenous Program

(1,000) is a major focus of the Wagga Club, Blue Star is a leadership program in which young people are sponsored to improve their skills, KidzCare offers out-of-school-hours care for more than 3,000 children. More than 100 different activities are offered by PCYC. The organisation is also a Registered Training Organisation, providing access to accredited courses and certificate qualifications including first aid, active volunteering, the construction industry white card and retail operations.

New programs at Wagga PCYC include the Wagga Wagga Youth Committee, Savannah Pride and Emergency Services Cadets.

RISEUP is a new strategy developed by the NSW Police Commissioner, connecting disengaged young people to workplace opportunities. It incorporates job ready programs, mentoring and vocational training for at risk youth between 15 and 18. The initiative aims to partner with employers across NSW to create meaningful workplace opportunities for young people who have embraced positive change in their lives.

Brett then gave a brief summary of the future plans for Wagga Wagga PCYC, and spoke optimistically about the new premises which will hopefully be completed for use in 2021.

At the conclusion of his presentation, he reminded us that PCYC was established in in 1937 by the then Police Commissioner, who approached Rotary to assist with raising the funds to launch the first 'Police Boys Club'. He indicated that a relationship between Rotary Clubs and PCYC in Wagga Wagga would be a desirable partnership in the future.
