President Alan advised us that from Monday 11th October, access to the Wagga Wagga Country Club for our meetings will be subject to a Health Order from the State Government, as per the details set out below in the advice from the Wagga Country Club:

Otherwise the Golf Club will be seeking individual verification and if you do not have it, access will be denied

Dear Members

Re: Double Vaccination Required - Monday 11th October 2021

As of Monday 11th October 2021, in line with the NSW Government Health Order, all people over the age of 16 years of age will have to be double vaccinated to come to the club and access the course.

All those attending the Club will have to show staff reasonable evidence that they have been double vaccinated or provide evidence of exemption. If you can't provide reasonable evidence of double vaccination, you will not be able to play golf or attend the clubhouse in accordance with the Health Order.

We appreciate that the rules set by the NSW Government are different to what everyone has been accustomed to and some people will not agree with the rules. Please understand that the Club and valued staff will have to comply with the Health Order. Club representatives are here to assist with compliance of the Health Order, signage will be on display to remind people of their obligations.

When attending the Club please have your evidence ready to show both in the Pro Shop and Clubhouse, we are working with our system providers to make this as easy as possible to administer.

Short & Sweet:

Gerry Page provided our Short and Sweet session this week. He gave a great rundown on his grandfather's brother-in-law, the Hon James Gormly MLC., gleaned from James' memoir which Gerry encountered while book sorting. Did you know the Honourable Member and Gerry have connections with Book Book, on the Tumbarumba Rd? No wonder he has been keen to use the reference at Book Fair time – book person from Book Book.

James was born in Ireland in 1836 and arrived with his parents in Australia in 1840. The family settled at Nangus in 1844. Before he was 10, he was an accomplished horseman, often assisting in droving of cattle. From the family of 7, 5 drowned in the 1852 flood which swept away most of Gundagai. Shortly after this, James then headed off to the Victorian gold fields, but not for long as he returned to Wagga Wagga in 1854 and bought land. Soon after,



at age 21 he entered into mail delivery contracts with the Postal Department and ended up with over 500 miles of line. At times he would have 300 horses on the road. He subsequently sold this business to Cobb and Co.

He had wide pastoral interests, but set up home at "Foxborough", now part of Wagga Wagga, where the old home site is in Hardy Ave, opposite Calvary Hospital, He became a Councillor, Mayor and later, Member for Wagga in the NSW Parliament, before many years in the Legislative Council of NSW.

James had a huge range of interests and documented much of this as part of his daily routine. As well as his ongoing pastoral pursuits, there was horse racing, the School of Arts, horse and stock judge, and the Catholic Church.

He also had early interest in the investigation and planning of Burrinjuck Dam, and was an advocate for a more reliable inflow to Lake Albert. He also wrote extensively of flooding of the Murrumbidgee River, having kept meticulous records of flood events He died in 1922.

Gerry has a spare copy of James' memoir "Exploration and Settlement in Australia" which he is willing to lend if you are interested, and you can learn more about the Book Book connection.

Thanks Gerry – very interesting, particularly with our guest speaker and current Mayor Greg Conkey being present.

Guest Speaker

Our Guest Speaker was soon to retire Wagga Wagga City Mayor, Councillor Greg Conkey OAM.who was introduced and welcomed by Neil Hilpern. Greg: was born and schooled in Cootamundra, became a cadet journalist in Cootamundra, then journalist in Armidale where he met his wife Jenny, and moving to Wagga Wagga in 1977. Then in 1979, he started The Leader newspaper and was owner/manager/editor for 25 years. In 2012, he was elected to Wagga Wagga City Council and has been Mayor from 2016 until now.



Greg gave us a broad overview of Wagga with enough detail to help us realise how fortunate we are to live here. He spoke of our great health system with 125 specialists and 90 GPs, a great education system with quality Primary, Secondary and Tertiary facilities. He also reminded us of our secure water supply with no restrictions during the most difficult recent drought, good energy supply, and good road, rail and air connections to other places. We also have the benefit of 2 major defence training facilities which add to our economy.

There has been huge infrastructure activity in our region over recent years, and this is continuing to happen. This includes upgrades to Defence Service facilities, Snowy 2.0, Transgrid power lines and substations, highway upgrades, Inland Rail, solar farms and hospitals. In Wagga itself we have a new hospital, the recently upgraded levee bank, the RiFl development at Bomen, including a Special Activation Precinct, Riverside development, an Active Travel Plan with upgrades to walking and cycling facilities, a multi activity Cycling Park at Pomingalarna Reserve and arterial road upgrades. So there is a lot going on, all contributing to our local economy.

There have been some challenges over the last five years, such as the sacking of the Council General Manager, the fighting for retention of the Rex maintenance facility at Forest Hill, issues with our Sister City link to Kunming in China, suspension of a Councillor, North Wagga flood protection, and the Code of Conduct. These were openly discussed and, hopefully, the consensus is that we have been well served by most of our Councillors.

Greg then answered a number of questions, before being well thanked for his wonderful presentation and service to the city by Allan Duffus.



The meeting concluded with President Alan reminding us about all wearing hats for our Hat Night with partners next week and the need to have been double vaccinated to be able to enter the Golf Club
