Our meeting this week was held at the Bidgee Strawberry Farm, Billagha Street, where we were fed by the Club's own catering wing, led by Tony Hutch & Graham Russell. Strawberry ice cream desserts were available as well as punnets of fresh strawberries. What a great outing!

President Alan welcomed 26 members and our one guest for the evening – Marnie Duffus. Following the invocation President Alan proposed a toast to our hosts Michael and Kylie Cashen and their daughter Lawanna.



Club Business:-.

- Clontarf Breakfast Roster for the second term was circulated by Secretary Ellen.

Short & Sweet:-

Because we were meeting at the Strawberry Farm, Mary Ann Kelly chose to tell us a little of the Marrambidya Wetlands which are located adjacent to the farm. The site of 20 hectares was developed and opened in 2015. It is on the site of the old disused sewerage ponds.

The Marrambidya Wetlands healing place was opened on National Apology Day in



2016 on the 8th anniversary of the Apology to the Stolen Generations. Developed in consultation with the local Wiradjuri community, the healing place includes a seating area made from river red gum and is located among native plants. There is a totem pole carved by the Wiradjuri Elders. A fallen scar tree provides the setting for a commemorative plaque. Mary Ann observed that there is a local aboriginal saying 'Look after the land and the rivers, and the land and rivers will look after you.' The land provided the Wiradjuri people with all they needed.

Fines-Master:-

Brad Bland's theme was unusual happenings in the world. A little like Ripley's 'Believe it or not.' Some examples:

- British researcher reveals slippers to be the item of clothing most likely to put the wearer in hospital.
- Philippino chilli eating competitions are another high risk activity especially if you eat as many as 300.
- Ontario police searched for a murderer after the discovery of a 900 year old skull. British archaeologists on the other hand let the matter slip when they discovered a 500 year old banana in a Tudor era dig site.
- There were stories involving animals a parrot in Greece tore up his ticket for obstructing the pavement (sensible bird). Thank you Brad for some insights into the unusual

Guest Speaker

David Cannon introduced Michael Cashen and invited him to tell us something about their farm. They have established a 40,000 plant hydroponic strawberry farm on a block of land on the Murrumbidgee flood plain adjacent to the recently developed Marrambidya Wetlands.

The strawberries grow on raised platforms at a convenient height for harvest and maintenance operations. The farm uses town water which has the advantage of having been purified and is delivered at a satisfactory pressure. Nutrients are added as required and plants are watered 3 times a day. As Michael observed they get 3 meals a day. Waste water is stored on site and reused to water lawns.

The farm is located on the wrong side of the levee which makes development applications a trial. However approval has been obtained to

increase the number of plants from 40,000 to 90,000. The current 4 hectares of plants yield up to 25 tonnes of strawberries each year. The main game is self-picking but up to 20 casuals are employed to pick surplus fruit. Surplus fresh fruit not sold is stored in 2 cool rooms, one at -2c, the other -18c. This stored fruit is used to make strawberry jam, pies or ice cream.

The biggest problem associated with growing strawberries is the Queensland fruit fly which seems to have become endemic to this area. It may be necessary to use nets in the future. Extreme heat or rain is also a problem - they keep the self-pickers away.

The large shed in which we are meeting was built 2 years ago and is much admired. Built on the only area of high ground available it is a great addition to the strawberry growing enterprise.

Neil Hilpern, in moving a vote of thanks, expressed appreciation for the insights Michael had given of their operation and for their hospitality.
