

with the furniture and shirts, our Club sent two water filtration units as part of our commitment to assist Dr Luc's efforts in his country.










Our Newest Member:-

Nepal Ghosh stepped into this space at short notice, putting all his 'Toastmasters' skills to use. Nepal's mother is currently visiting from Bangladesh. When they all went out recently, people said hello to her, and she smiled at them in return, as she speaks no English. Nepal remarked that studies have shown that communication is 93% body language and only 7% verbal. Nepal then focused on the spoken word:

According to UNESCO, there are 7117 languages in the world (Australia has more than 200 languages). English is the most commonly spoken language, with 1,132 million speakers. Mandarin

is next with 1,117 million speakers, then Hindi (650 million). Nepal's native language, Bengali is the 7th most commonly spoken language in the world.

International Mother Language Day is celebrated on 21st February each year to promote awareness of linguistic and cultural diversity and to promote multilingualism. This date was chosen as it is the anniversary of the day in 1952 when the people of Bangladesh (then East Pakistan) fought (and died) for recognition of the Bengali language after Urdu was declared to be the sole national language of Pakistan. UNESCO formally recognised International Mother Language Day in 1999, and the United Nations declared 2008 as the International Year of Languages.

Every culture in the world deserves to have the opportunity to maintain its unique language.
